Preparation

Photocopy and cut apart the 14 cue cards.

Procedure

1 Prepare students for the activity by telling them that you are going to define some words and that they have to tell you what words they are, e.g.

Teacher: It's a room in the house.

Students: The kitchen?

Teacher: No, there's a sofa there and you

watch TV.

Students: The living room!

- 2 Divide the students into two teams (A and B).
- 3 Shuffle the cards and place them randomly on your table, face down.
- 4 Ask students in each group to choose a leader.
- 5 Leaders choose one of the cards on your table. Taking turns, one person from each team defines the words on the card, one by one, to their group. Students are not allowed to draw pictures or use gestures as part of their descriptions.
- 6 Give a point to the first team to complete a card. Allow 90 seconds as a maximum amount of time each team can take. Encourage them to hurry so their overall team score is better than their opponent's.
- 7 There are 14 different cards, so each team can play the game seven times.
- 9 The team with the highest score wins.
- 10 Make sure different students give the definitions each time.

Option

The game is played by two teams. Instead of defining all the words, leaders choose one of the words and mime or draw it on the board. Students guess the word.

Additional ideas

Write five categories on the board, e.g. a country, an adjective, a famous person, an animal, a verb. Students have one minute to write down one word from each category, on pieces of paper. Use their lists to play the game described above.
