### Family chain

#### Level 2 • Beginner-Elementary

Age: Primary (6-11)

<u>Language aims:</u> To understand instructions in English; to create an extended family chain; to practise using names of an extended family

Time: 20–30 minutes

Student grouping: Individuals, whole class

Materials: One copy of the worksheet per student (optional); multiple pairs of scissors; large sheets of paper; a picture or photo of an extended family; colouring pens or pencils; an extended family chain you have already made from the worksheet and one ready to make

Language focus: Mother, father, sister, brother, family, aunt, uncle, grandmother, grandfather, cousins; cut, put, colour, write; This is my ... (Specific language for 'step-' or 'half' families may be needed, e.g. step-mother, half brother. Introduce step-or half to the whole class.)

#### Step 4

When everyone has finished, ask individuals to hold up their chains and tell the class who each person is, for example 'This is my mother. This is my father', etc.

#### Follow-up activity

Make a class chart to show how many uncles, aunts and cousins each child has.

#### **Procedure**

#### Step 1

Show the picture of the extended family you've prepared. Point to the woman and elicit mother. Do the same for father, sister, brother, cousin, grandfather, grandmother, aunt and uncle.

#### Step 2

Show the class the family chain you prepared earlier. Then show them how to make a family chain by folding a piece of paper to the width of the model, drawing around the template and cutting out carefully to avoid breaking the chain. You can hand out the worksheet so the children can see the instructions.

#### Step 3

Ask the children to make their chains with each person representing a person from their own family. As they're working on their chains, go around the class and ask 'Who's this?' for each person on the chain. Elicit 'My mother, uncle, sister', etc.



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
