

# Find your way around

## Aim

To review indirect questions. To practice giving directions.


## Vocabulary

## **Preparation**

Photocopy and cut up enough maps so that each group of three students has three different maps.

#### Answers



#### **Procedure**

- 1 Ask students to name some buildings or places in a town. Write these on the board, e.g. bank, post office, restaurant etc.
- 2 Review indirect question forms: Can you tell me / Do you know where ... is? Write some examples on the board, e.g. Do you know where the bank is? Review prepositions of place briefly, if necessary (on the left / right, opposite, near etc).
- 3 Put the class into groups of three. Give each student in the group a different map, A, B or C.
- 4 Explain that each student has information about one third of the places on the map.
- 5 Students complete their maps by asking colleagues where things are.
- 6 Write an example on the board, if necessary, e.g.
  - Student A: Excuse me, can you tell me where the zoo is please?
  - Student B: Yes. it's on Beach Road.
- 7 Set a time limit of ten minutes and start the activity.
- 8 Walk around listening and helping where necessary.
- When the time is up, conduct a whole class feedback session. Ask students where the different places are to check their answers.

## Option

This could be done as a whole class activity with students allowed to get only one piece of information from each other before they move on to another partner.

#### Additional ideas

Check that the maps are correct by asking for volunteers to draw parts of the complete map on the board.
