Age: Older teenagers / Adults Level: Elementary–Pre-intermediate (A1–A2) Time: 60–90 minutes

Activity: In this lesson, students will:

- read short facts about wedding anniversaries and use some of the language and grammar points in a personalization task;
- 2. learn about the names given to different wedding anniversaries;
- use wedding anniversary names to talk about people they know;
- 4. decide on an appropriate wedding anniversary gift.

Language focus: vocabulary related to wedding anniversaries, as well as the materials and elements used to describe wedding anniversaries by year and gifts from these materials; the verbs to celebrate and to get married

Materials: one copy of the worksheet per student

Procedure

1. Warmer

Give out the worksheet and draw students' attention to the first picture (the wedding). Find out if any students are married by asking, *Are you married? When did you get married?* Use their answers to find out how long they've been married, e.g. *I got married in 2005. I've been married for _____ years.*

Now read out the rubric and check understanding. Students fill in the gaps with the names given to wedding anniversaries, matching the words in the box to the pictures. Check answers, and point out that the gifts for the earlier year anniversaries are less expensive, whilst the gifts for the later anniversaries are more expensive.

Key:

1st – paper 10th – tin 25th – silver 40th – ruby 50th – golden 60th – diamond

2. Key words and expressions

Students read the words on the left and match them with the definitions on the right. They then read the text/facts and underline the words as they come across them. There is often more than one example of each key word. Tell the students they should underline all the examples that they find.

3. Mixed grammar – to celebrate and to get married

Students work together to complete the six sentences with the correct form of the verbs provided in the box. First they should decide whether the missing verb is *celebrate* or *get married*, then they should identify any signal words such as *next month, next year, in 1993* or *for 26 years* to help them decide which tense is needed to complete each sentence. The tenses are included in the key below, if the students are struggling and need a prompt.

Key:

- 1. are celebrating (present continuous for a planned future event)
- 2. celebrate (to-infinitive)
- 3. are getting married (present continuous + past participle for a planned future event)
- 4. got married (past simple + past participle for a completed action)
- 5. have been married (present perfect + past participle for an ongoing situation)
- 6. celebrated (past simple for a completed action)

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4. Me, my family and my friends

In this grammar and writing personalization task, students work on their own and change details in the sentences in exercise 3 to make them true for them, their family or their friends. An example sentence is given in which the details that have been changed are underlined.

Once they have written their sentences and you have checked that the grammar points are used correctly, they should read them out to others in the group.

5. Wedding anniversary gifts

In this communicative activity each student should first complete the text about a married couple they know. Provide an example for them to model their text on, e.g. *Robert and Carmen got married in 2005. They have been married for 14 years. Soon they will celebrate their crystal wedding anniversary.* Then, in part b, the students sit together in pairs or small groups and read out their texts to each other, providing any further information they think might help to choose presents. For example, *Robert is my brother and Carmen is my sister-in-law. Robert is 45 years old, and Carmen is 43 years old.* The students then come up with gift suggestions for each couple, taking into account how long the couples have been married. They should make sure that their gifts are related to the name of the wedding anniversary, e.g. 15 years = crystal = possible gift of crystal wine glasses. They can look back to exercise 1 for the full list of anniversary names.

Finally, in part c, students read out their texts to the whole class and, using the language prompt, say what they decided to buy the couple for their wedding anniversary.

Wedding anniversary facts



- A married couple celebrates their wedding anniversary on the same date each year. For example, a married couple that got married on 25th July will celebrate their wedding anniversary on 25th of July every year that they are married.
- In many countries, married couples have a party to celebrate 'special' wedding anniversaries such as their silver or golden wedding anniversaries.
- Karam Chand and his wife Kartari celebrated their 90th wedding anniversary in 2015. They were the world's oldest married couple. They got married in India in 1925 and moved to England in 1965.
- Wedding anniversary celebrations started in Roman times.
- From the 18th century, a couple might get a silver wreath from their friends for their 25th wedding anniversary and a golden wreath for their 50th wedding anniversary.
- British couples get a message from the Queen on their 60th, 65th and 70th wedding anniversaries, and on every wedding anniversary after that.
- Couples in the US who have been married for 50 years or more get a message from the president on their wedding anniversary.
