# one stop english Solutions for English Teaching

### Sound and spelling

Level: Pre-intermediate and above

Target age: Adults and teenagers

Time needed: 10 minutes (x6)

**Summary:** The relationship between spelling and pronunciation in English can be confusing for a number of reasons. This activity focuses on homographs (words with the same spelling but different pronunciation) and homophones (words with the same pronunciation but different spelling), as well as other pairs of words whose pronunciation learners tend to find confusing.

#### Procedure

There are six sets of words, which you can use on different occasions; one set is probably enough for one lesson but of course, if the class are keen, you could use more.

- Learners work on one set of words in pairs and try to decide whether each pair of words has the same pronunciation or not. Tell students to mark the pairs with s for 'same pronunciation' or d for 'different pronunciation'.
- 2. Play the recording for the students to check.
- 3. Finally, go through the answers as a class.

Note: In a few cases, the answer will be different in different accents of English, e.g. depending on whether 'r' is sounded in words like court. (See rhotic and homophone in the pronunciation glossary.)

#### Alternative procedure

Alternatively, you could do the activity as a team game in class. You could adjudicate yourself, or get learners to check each others' answers by looking the words up in dictionaries.
