
Most verbs add s (begins, pulls, borrows, asks, stops, listens, walks, eats). This includes verbs ending with a vowel +y (plays, pays, says).

Verbs ending with a consonant +y use ies (carry - carries). Verbs ending with x, s, ch, sh or o add es (washes, relaxes, finishes, pushes, watches, goes).
