LUCKY IN LOVE
Age: Teenager/Adult
Level: Intermediate (B1)
Time: 60 minutes
Activity: In this lesson, students will:
» Match typical expressions to situations
» Role-play a romantic situation
» Learn some phrasal verbs related to relationships
» Complete a conversation related to dating
Language focus: vocabulary related to relationships;
speaking as part of an informal role play
Materials: one copy of the worksheet per student
PROCEDURE

1. Draw two faces on the board, one sad and one happy, and give them both names. Explain that one is sad because s/he is unlucky in love. The other is happy because s/he is lucky in love. Ask the students what kinds of things they could be happy or unhappy about. For example, one is always meeting people, while the other never meets anybody; one has a long stable relationship with a great partner, while the other has a series of short, terrible relationships; etc.
2. Ask students if they think they are lucky or unlucky in love. Tell them they are going to play a game to find out.
3. Hand out the worksheets. Ask students to read the five romantic dilemmas in Exercise 1 and think of something they would say in each, sharing their answers in pairs or small groups. Then ask them to match the sentences a-o to the situations. Check answers.
4. Now, ask students to read through the fifteen endings to the stories individually. Can they tell which endings go with which dilemma? Clarify any meanings or vocabulary, if necessary, then check that students have realized that the first row contains the three possible conclusions to the first dilemma, and so on.
5. Students role-play one of the dilemmas in pairs. They pick a dilemma together. Student A chooses one of the three matching sentences to say, while Student B chooses one of the three conclusions and prepares what they are going to say. When they are ready, they act out the dialogue. Students then switch roles and choose another dilemma to role-play. The pairs with the funniest dialogues perform them for the class.
6. Students work through Exercise 2. In part A they practise phrasal verbs related to love situations. In part B they complete a dialogue in which someone invites someone else out on a date. In part $C$ students reflect on the difference between how men and women feel loved.
