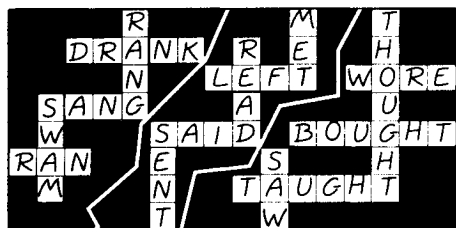


Crossword in Three Parts

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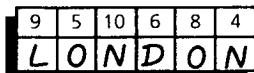
The five verbs in the first part have the vowel sound /æ/.

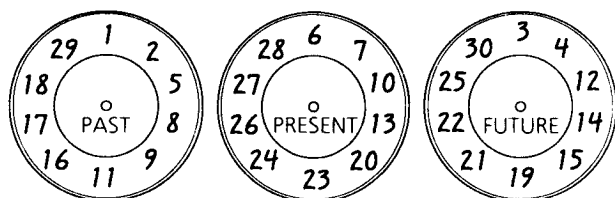

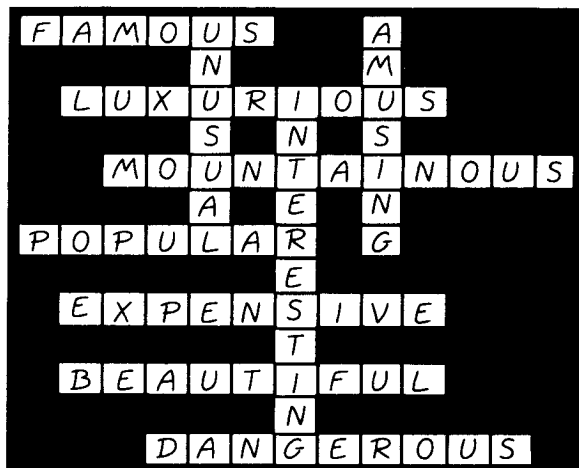

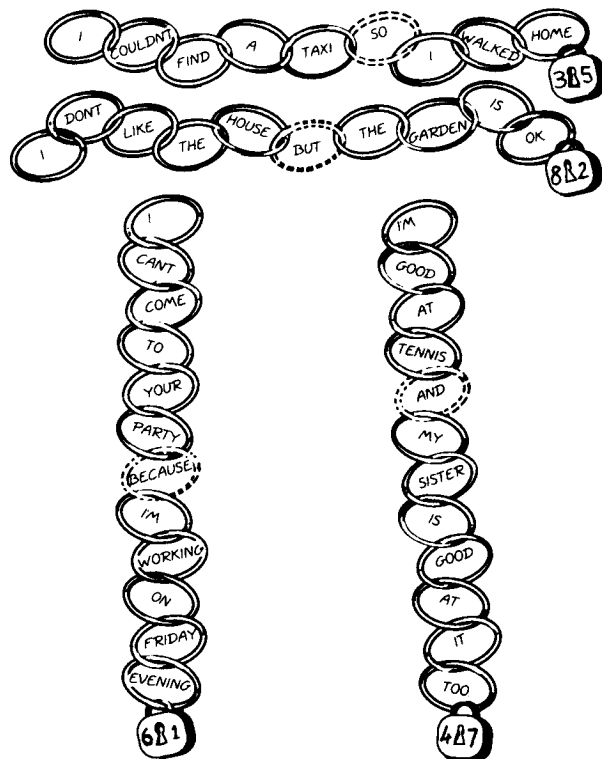
A Superlative Crossword

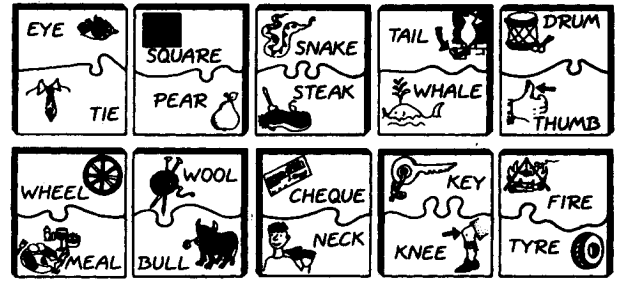

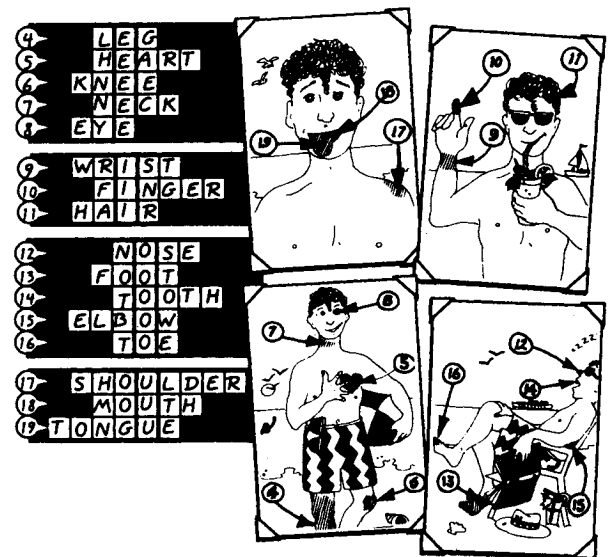
