Teacher's notes

Age: Teenagers/Adults

Level: Pre-intermediate (A2) - Intermediate (B1)

Time: 30 minutes

Activity: In this lesson, students will:

- 1. do a quiz about when things happened for the first time;
- 2. talk about personal firsts.

Language focus: saying dates; past simple questions; past simple passive

Materials: one copy of the worksheet per student

Procedure

- 1. Tell students they are going to do a quiz about when things happened for the first time.
- Divide the class into teams. Hand out copies of the worksheet and direct students to Exercise 1.
 Students complete the chart with the year that they think the things happened.
- 3. Check answers as a class and award points according to the scoring scheme. See which team has the most points at the end.

Corn flakes were served for the first time. (1897)
The first issue of Time Magazine was published. (1923)

- TECH TIP: As a follow-up activity, you could ask students to research more historical firsts and construct their own version of the quiz from Exercise 1 for other students, using a website such as www.biographyonline.net/famous-firsts/. Or, as a homework activity, you could ask students to pick one of the firsts they've learned about and write a paragraph about it why not get them to post their research in a class blog, and encourage their fellow students to read and comment?
- 4. Tell students that they are now going to talk about the first time they did things in their own lives. Tell students to look at Exercise 2 and read through the questions. For lower-level classes, you could suggest they answer the questions individually first, taking brief notes to help them.
- 5. Students should work in pairs and use the questions to interview each other. They should be encouraged to ask follow-up questions each time. For example: 'When was the first time you went abroad?', 'Where did you go?', 'Who did you go with?', 'Did you have a good time?', etc.
- 6. In their pairs, students write two more questions about personal firsts. Ask them to then combine with another pair to form a group of four. Each group should then ask and answer their four new questions. If there is time, you could ask groups to swap questions once they are finished.
- 7. Each group reports any funny or interesting stories to the class.
