Prefixes by Svetlana Urisman

Age: Adults, young adults

Level: Intermediate Time: 40-60 mins

Aim: To revise word formation (prefixes); to

enrich vocabulary

Key skills: Grammar and speaking

Materials: One copy of the worksheet per student;

one copy of the board game and cut-up cards per group of students; one die per group of students; one counter per team (or students can use

coins/rubbers instead)

Preparation

Cut up the cards.

Procedure

1. Hand out the worksheet. Ask your students to complete Activity 1, working alone.

Key: a. unputdownable; b. precooked; c. illegible; d. undo

2. Ask students to complete Activity 2.

Key: unputdownable – adjective – a book that is unputdownable is so interesting or exciting that you do not want to stop reading it; precooked – adjective – precooked food has been cooked or partly cooked so that it can be heated and eaten at a later time; illegible – adjective – difficult or impossible to read; undo – verb – to open, untie or remove something so that it no longer closes, fastens or connects another thing; to give a computer an instruction to ignore the last change that you made to a document; irrelevant – adjective – not important to or not directly connected with what you are discussing or doing

3. Ask students to work in pairs to complete Activity 3. **Key:** a. undid; b. unputdownable; c. irrelevant;

4. Proceed to Activity 4. Students can still work in pairs.

Additional task: You might want to ask students to think of some words containing the prefixes in Activity 4. You could turn it into a quick competition with students working in two groups, trying to think of more words than the other team.

Key (possible answers): misbehaviour, misunderstood; reapply, reheated, reappeared, rewritten, rearrangement, re-election, recapture; dislike, dissimilar, disbelief; impossible, impatient, immature; illogical, illegal; irregularity, irreplaceable; unable, unhappy, uncooked, unzip, unhurriedly; under-exposed, under-nourished; overheat, overreaction, overconfident; prewar, prearranged; post-impressionist, post-dated (cheque); non-alcoholic, non-aggression; multilingual, multimillionaire

- 5. Now proceed to the board game. You can either ask individual students to play against one another or they can form teams to make it more competitive. All the rules are outlined on the worksheet. Players/Teams can use counters provided by you to play the game or they can use coins or rubbers as counters. The cut-up cards should be placed face down on the table.
- The secret word stage is optional. Use it if you have enough time and want to recycle the vocabulary.

Key: (from the top left) misread; impolite; underestimated; irresistible; mistrust/ distrust; indefinite; re-elected; immature; irreplaceable; illegal; unacceptable; uncertain; misjudged; unknown/unfamiliar; disapproving; misunderstanding; improbable; disarm; overslept; mislead; inaudible
