CELEBRATIONS one stop english

Review of the year

Age: Teenagers/Adults Level: Elementary (A1) Time: 30 minutes



Activity: In this lesson, students will:

- 1. talk about global events from the past year;
- 2. talk about their best and worst things from the last year;
- make resolutions for the coming year using 'to be + going to'.

Language focus: past simple; future simple Preparation: prepare a slideshow of some images of major world events from the previous year Materials: one copy of the worksheet per student

Procedure

1. Play a slideshow or beam images of world events from the previous year you have prepared from a projector and show these to your students, asking them to identify each of the events. Then, write the year on the board and ask your students to work in pairs and discuss other important world events they remember from the past year. Ask your class to discuss what they know about each event and conduct a whole class discussion, highlighting any new vocabulary which comes up.

TECH TIP: Before class, find and save the images that you want to show in class, as this will save you time in your lesson. You could also use a good image sharing site like <u>www.flickr.com</u>.

- 2. Tell the students that they are going to review their favourite and least favourite things from the past year. Hand out the worksheet. Go through the categories as a class. Ask the students to work in pairs and try to think of two answers for each category. Monitor while they discuss their answers and ask them to use the prompts in the extension activity to expand on their answers.
- 3. When they have finished, ask them to present their answers to the class. Write all of the answers on the board and tell the students they should vote for the top two in each category. At this stage, encourage

students to try to justify their answers or criticize other answers, as the class focus should be on fluency rather than accuracy.

Teacher's notes

- 4. Ask your students to work in pairs again and brainstorm any other categories that they think should be included in the review of the year. When they have finished, ask them to present their ideas to the class and follow the same voting procedure as before.
- Tell students that to finish the class they are going to look forward to next year. If possible, elicit which structure is used to talk about future plans. If no-one knows, draw students' attention to the Language Focus section in Exercise 2. Explain the grammar rules and go through the examples. Ask students to write three more sentences for themselves and then read them out to the class.

LANGUAGE TIP: When teaching this language point, it is a good idea to introduce the short form going + to = 'gonna'. Not only is it important for raising awareness of connected speech, but it will also improve students' listening skills. However, it is important to make the distinction between when we make the contraction (before a verb) and when we don't (before a noun).
