

Procedure

- 1 Give a worksheet to each student in the class.
- 2 Tell the students that they are going to play *Bingo* and draw their attention to the list of verbs on their worksheets.
- 3 Ask students to choose 25 of those verbs and write the past participle form in the *Bingo* squares. They should put a different verb in each square.
- 4 Check that all the students are clear about the past particple form of verbs. Elicit some examples before they complete their cards, e.g. Teacher: What is the past participle of see? Students: Seen.
- 5 When students have completed their cards, explain how to play the game.
 - Tell students that you are going to call out verbs in their infinitive form.
 - The students' task is to look for the corresponding past participle form of those verbs on their bingo cards.
 - If students have the corresponding past participle, they should cross it out.
 - The first student to have all the Bingo squares crossed out wins.
- 6 Make sure all the students are ready and start calling out the verbs.
- 7 When a student calls out *Bingo!* have him / her read his / her card aloud so that you can check that all the past participle forms are correct.

Option

Instead of stopping the game after a student has crossed out all the 25 squares on his / her Bingo card, the winner could be the first student to complete five in a line, either vertically, horizontally or diagonally.
