Preparation

Photocopy a set of cards and cut them up. One set should be enough if you can divide your class into four groups (see Procedure).

Procedure

- 1 Divide the class into four groups of up to six or seven students. If you have more than 28 students, you may wish to create five or six smaller groups. In this case you will need an extra set of cards. Two groups will have to work on the same topic.
- 2 Give one card to each group.
- 3 Explain they must think of ways to sell their vacation idea to the class.
- 4 Give students time to prepare their arguments. They may need to appoint one person to take notes and one to be the main spokesperson.
- 5 Walk around helping students with grammatical structures where necessary.
- 6 Have each group present their case to the class. They should try to use the structures suggested on the cards.
- 7 Have the class vote for the best vacation option.

Option

If you have an artistic class they might want to make a poster for their vacation as well.

Additional ideas

A writing task could be to imagine that they are on one of the vacations and write a letter to a friend.
