

Album TRACKS

A piece of music on an album is called a *track*. So an album could have ten *tracks* on it, for example.

Clues

In the title of *Side B Track 2*, half the words begin with the same letter.

The title of *Side A Track 4* includes an adjective of nationality.

The title of *Side B Track 5* has two words, and the second word is longer than the first word.

The title of *Side A Track 2* has nineteen letters.

In the title of *Side B Track 4*, both words begin with the same letter, and one of the words is a girl's name.

The title of *Side A Track 1* is just one word (an adjective).

The title of *Side A Track 5* includes a plural noun.

The title of *Side B Track 1* includes the word *me*, but not the word *you*.

The title of *Side B Track 3* includes the word *you*, but not the word *me*.

In the title of *Side A Track 3*, the last letter of the first word is the same as the first letter of the last word.

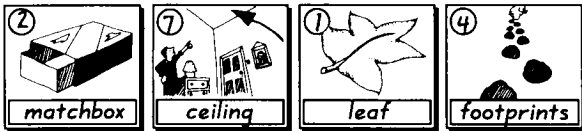
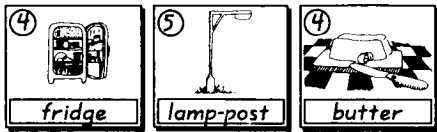

Elephant Jokes

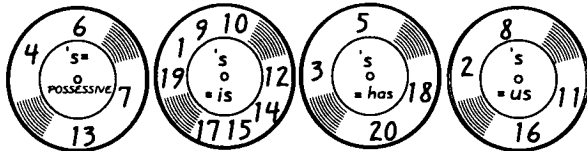
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- How does an elephant get down from a tree? – It sits on a leaf and waits for autumn.

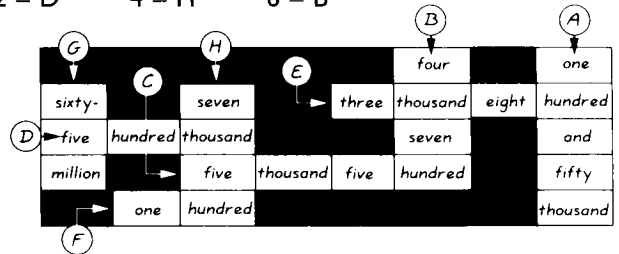

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Words including the letter **N** are placed at *North*; words including the letters **NW** are placed at *North West*; words including the letter **S** are placed at *South*; words including the letters **SE** are placed at *South East*, etc.

North: PANDA, PAINT, BALCONY

North East: NET, NECK

East: CAMERA, LADDER, COMPUTER

South East: CASE, MUSEUM, HORSE

South: SHIP, SCARF, TOURIST, LIPSTICK

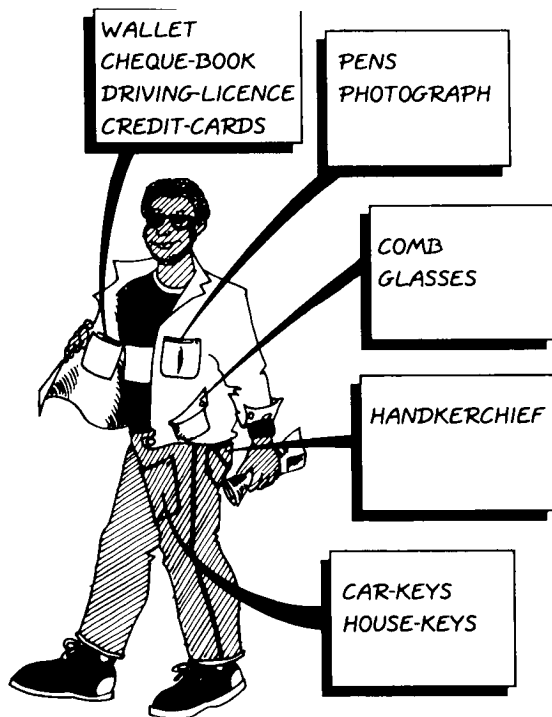
South West: SWITCH

West: WATCH, COW, WOOD

North West: RUNWAY

Five Pockets

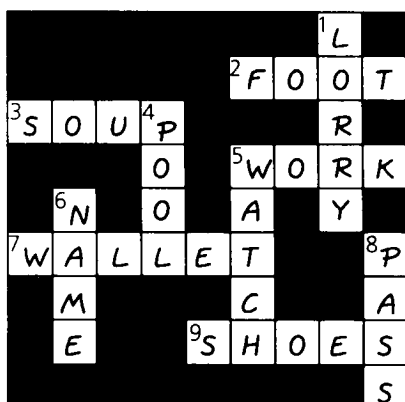
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Note: In American English, *driver's license* is used instead of *driving-licence*.

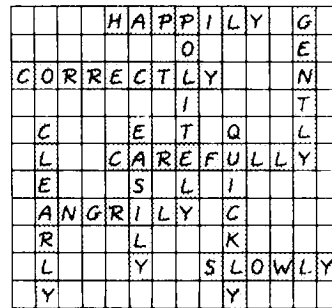
It Doesn't Rhyme!

Most adjectives become adverbs by adding *-ly*: badly, carefully, clearly, correctly, politely, quickly, slowly.

Adjectives ending *-le* change this ending to *-ly*: gentle – gently.

Adjectives ending *-y* change this ending to *-ily*: angry – angrily, easy – easily, happy – happily.

For the adjective *good*, the adverb is *well*.

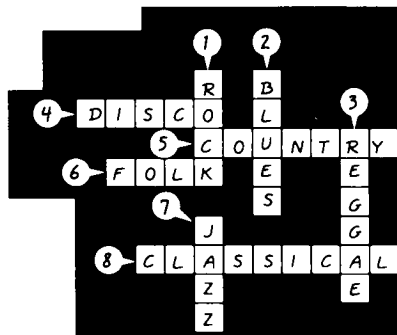
