South: SHIP, SCARF, TOURIST, LIPSTICK

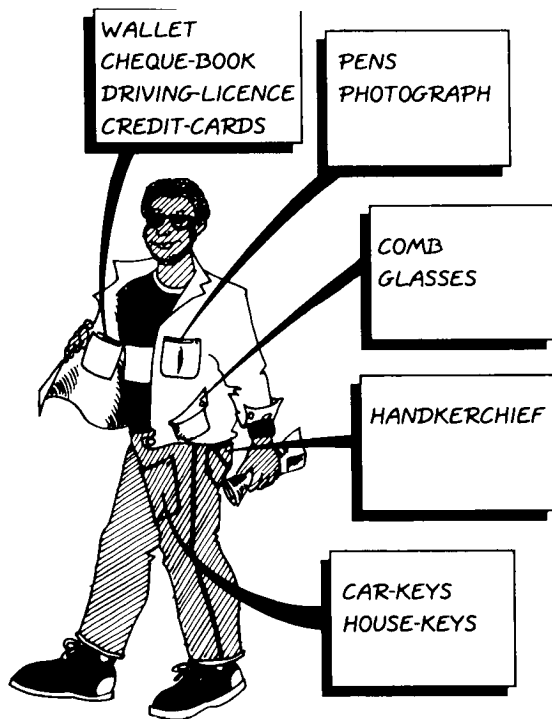

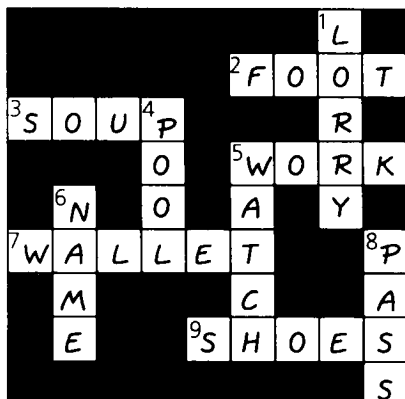

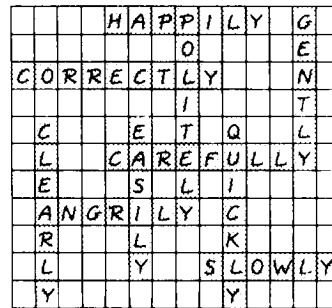

For the adjective *good*, the adverb is *well*.

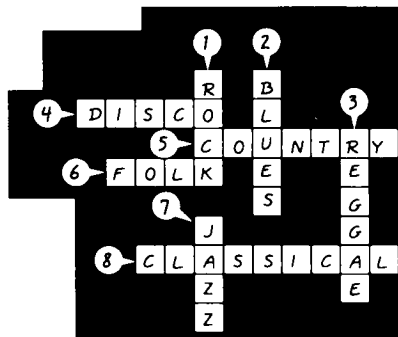
