


It doesn't rhyme!




- How does an elephant get down from a tree? It sits on a leaf and waits for autumn.



Words including the letter **N** are placed at *North*; words including the letters **NW** are placed at *North* West; words including the letter **S** are placed at *South*; words including the letters **SE** are placed at *South* East, etc.

North: PANDA, PAINT, BALCONY

North East: NET, NECK

East: CAMERA, LADDER, COMPUTER South East: CASE, MUSEUM, HORSE South: SHIP, SCARF, TOURIST, LIPSTICK


South West: SWITCH

West: WATCH, COW, WOOD



Remember:

Most adjectives become adverbs by adding -ly: badly, carefully, clearly, correctly, politely, quickly, slowly. Adjectives ending -le change this ending to -ly: gentle - gently.

Adjectives ending -y change this ending to -ily: angry - angrily, easy - easily, happy - happily. For the adjective good, the adverb is well.


