Procedure

Introductory activities

- 1. Introduce the topic by asking students whether they have ever entered a writing competition.
- Tell students that they will write a short description in response to a competition, but first prepare them for the topic. Hand out the worksheet, and discuss the quote. Ask students to research the concept of Neighbour Day at <u>www.neighbourday.org</u>.
- 3. After their online research, ask students what they thought of Neighbour Day. Discuss and respond to their comments.

Reading and language activities

- Have students read the Neighbour Day Competition text. Discuss the meaning of any vocabulary and phrases that are not understood by your students. Explain the structure of the text as indicated (introductory sentence, description and so on).
- 5. Direct students to the structure activity, and instruct them to correctly order the sections.

Key: 1. e; 2. c; 3. d; 4. b; 5. a

- Discuss the meanings of the new words and phrases in the vocabulary on the worksheet. Instruct students to write a sentence for every word or phrase that is new to them.
- 7. Tell students to complete the cloze reading activity on adjectives. Check the answers.

Key: 1. lovely; 2. friendly; 3. safe; 4. annual; 5. generous; 6. helpful; 7. thriving; 8. caring

8. Ask students to think about why adjectives are important in this kind of text.

9. Ask students to identify the verbs that describe what the neighbours do.

Key: share; organize; pick up (post); assist; transform

- 10. Ask students why the writer might have chosen these verbs. The questions about the adjectives and the verbs will help them think about which grammar features are important in a description of a person.
- 11. Point out the synonym activity. Have them complete the activity, then check the answers.

Key: 1. pleasant; 2. sociable; 3. secure; 4. yearly; 5. giving; 6. considerate; 7. flourishing; 8. kind

12. Point out that when we write, we can choose from a variety of words to express our intended meaning. Ask students to think about which word they would prefer to use in the text – either the word in the original text or in this modified text – and discuss why they would make that choice.

Writing activity

- 13. Students will now write a description of a favourite neighbour. This activity will allow students to think about the structural and linguistic features they have learned about. Your assessment of their text will allow you to check that they have understood this.
- 14. To prepare for the writing activity, ask students to think about a neighbour and jot down words and phrases that describe their neighbour.
- 15. Put students in pairs, and ask them to talk about their neighbour before they start the writing activity.
- 16. Finally, instruct students to complete the writing activity, monitoring and offering help as needed.
- Display the texts around the room, then ask students to vote on the best text. If it's a draw, you get the deciding vote. Announce the winner of the writing competition.
