

PREPARATION

Make one copy of the worksheet for each student in the class.

TIME

20 to 30 minutes

PROCEDURE

- 1. Write the headings of the columns from the worksheet on the board and brainstorm what aspects of a vacation turn it into a dream vacation or a nightmare vacation for the students. Write a few suggestions under each heading on the board.
- 2. Give one copy of the worksheet to each student in the class and ask them to put some of the words and expressions on the worksheet under the headings according to their personal opinion. They do not have to do this with all of the words and expressions, only those which they personally associate with a good or a bad vacation.
- 3. Ask them to add anything else they can think of under the headings.
- 4. Now ask them to compare their worksheets with one or more partners and note any similarities or differences.
