Live from London podcasts

Level: Upper-intermediate

Age: Teenagers / adults

Time needed: 30 minutes approx

Language and skills: Smoking vocabulary, listening for gist and specific information, focus on features of spoken English

Warm up

Tell the students you are going to read them a series of ingredients of something. They should listen and write down what they think it is. Read out the following:

Carbon monoxide, nitrogen oxides, hydrogen cyanide, ammonia and more than 500 other additives.

Ask what people wrote down. The correct answer is a *cigarette*.

Stage 1

Distribute the worksheet and ask students to do the crossword puzzle first on their own. They can then check in pairs. Go through the answers, clarifying if there are any words they do not understand.

Answers:

3. pipe 5. cigarette 6. cigar 7. smoke Down

1. tobacco 2. give up 3. put out 4. lighter 6. cancer

Stage 2

Tell students to read the information in the box in Exercise 2 and ask them what they think. Do this open class, but keep it brief as they will be able to discuss it further after the listening.

Stage 3

Let students read the instructions for the first listening activity and then play the podcast, pausing after each speaker and allowing students to confer in pairs.

Answers:

Speaker 1 – sort of in favour; Speaker 2 – sort of in favour; Speaker 3 – sort of against; Speaker 4 – sort of against; Speaker 5 – completely in favour; Speaker 6 – completely in favour; Speaker 7 – sort of against; Speaker 8 – sort of against.





Stage 4

Play the podcast again, and ask students to choose the correct answer. This time play it all the way through without stopping.

Answers:

- 1. Speaker 1 likes to smoke when he is drinking.
- 2. Speaker 2 wants to stop smoking.
- 3. Speaker 3 thinks that smoking should be **banned** in eating areas.
- 4. Speaker 4 doesn't like to smoke if he thinks it will bother other people.
- 5. Speaker 5 is a non-smoker.
- Speaker 6's hair used to smell of smoke after a night out.
- 7. Speaker 7 thinks that smoking is banned in **too many places** now.
- 8. Speaker 8 prefers going out with friends for a drink in **Germany**.

Stage 5

Now distribute copies of the transcript and allow students to read it. When they have finished, ask them to match the underlined expressions to their meanings in exercise 5. Tell them to make a note of these expressions as they should try to use them in the next exercise.

Answers: a)3,8,11 b)1 c)4 d)2,9 e) 5,6,7,10

Stage 6

Tell students to work individually and choose one of the topics in exercise 6, or a topic of their own that they could comfortably express different opinions on. Give them some time to prepare this. Then put the students in pairs and ask each one to take turns presenting their topic and arguments. The other student should listen and ask questions or express their own opinions on the topic. Students switch roles and repeat the exercise at the end.



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


Introduction


