

# **Homecoming hero**

## HOMECOMING HERO

He's risked his life and spent hundreds of thousands of dollars to make his dream come true. Seventeenyear-old Zac Sunderland is one of the youngest people ever to sail solo around the world.

On June 14, 2008, Zac climbed aboard his boat, Intrepid, to start his 40,000-mile journey around the world. He has sailed from the west coast of the USA to Australia, then across the Indian Ocean to South Africa. He's had to survive violent storms, a crippled boat and an encounter with pirates. This interview took place when Zac was on the home stretch after a year of sailing.

"I've been really lucky", Zac said. "This isn't something I've done on my own. Everything just fell into place to make it happen. I've been sailing all my life, and I have great parents who've helped me a lot. It's been an amazing experience and a lot of fun."

### Life at sea

"The first six months at sea were harder than the second six months. When I first left home, it all felt strange and new. It took a few months to get used to being away from everything and everyone I knew and to living on canned food and not much sleep. But now it feels like everyday life.

Time goes by quickly out here, and there's always something that needs doing on the boat. Sometimes I have to stop on an island to repair something, and other times I just make sure that everything is in working order. I've learned so much and have become a better sailor.

I had planned to graduate on the boat, but I haven't done any studying for a while. I only have three classes to finish before I can graduate, so I'll do that once I get home.

#### Hard times

The sea doesn't frighten me. I respect the sea. But I don't like it when things I can't control go wrong. I've had a lot of problems with my boat, for example. Because of a problem with my engine, I stopped at Saint Helena, an island in the South

Atlantic about halfway between Africa and South America. It's one of the most remote places in the world. I had to wait three weeks to get the parts I needed for the engine. That was really frustrating.

I had to cross the equator twice. It's really hot and there's hardly any wind, so you can be stuck in one place for a whole week. But there are also dangerous storms called squalls. So even though you're going nowhere for days, you have to be alert all the time in case you get hit by a squall.

My most frightening experience occurred in the Indian Ocean in October 2008, about 150 miles off the coast of Indonesia. A pirate ship came and started sailing around me. I didn't know what they wanted or what they were going to do. I'd heard stories of pirates firing at boats and sinking them, so I locked myself in my cabin and called the coast watch patrol. When the patrol arrived, the pirates left – so luckily, nothing happened in the end.

### **Exciting places**

10 I've visited so many parts of the world. It's been amazing to see all the different cultures and how people live. Everywhere I went, people were waiting for me, and sometimes my dad or friends came out to meet me too. People everywhere were really friendly and interested in hearing my stories.

The most beautiful place I visited was Cocos Keeling Island, which is a tiny place in the Indian Ocean. It's not even six square miles – but it has white beaches and green jungles. Only about 500 people live there.



One place I really hated was Port Moresby, the capital of Papua New Guinea. I had to stay there 12

for about a week because of another problem with my boat. It was really dangerous. You can't walk around there alone at night or you might get robbed or even killed.

### Homecoming

It's going to be incredible to return to the US at the end of this trip. I can't wait to see my family and friends. The first thing I want to eat is a cheeseburger. American food is the best! I miss it a lot. Then I want to go surfing and skateboarding with my friends. We're also planning to do a road trip. We've bought an old van and will probably go to Mexico or across the US. It'll be nice to travel on land again after all these months at sea.

#### Media star

14 I did hundreds of interviews about my journey last summer. After the first few, I learned how to answer all the questions and what to say. When I get home, I'll do interviews on at least three TV shows, including The Oprah Winfrey Show. That will be very exciting.

I'm used to being in front of the camera now. I've had cameras on my boat ever since leaving home. I use them for a few hours a day to film my life and talk about what's been happening. I hope to make aTV show when I get home. I've already started writing a book about my experience.

### The next adventure

I've been getting so many job offers in the last few months. I could sail around the world giving sailing classes. Or I could go on a new adventure. I'm thinking about sailing across the top of Alaska for six months with a friend. We'd be alone for weeks at a time and stop on small, remote islands. That would be amazing.

The biggest thing I've learned in the last year is that you can do anything you want to do. Never let anyone tell you that you can't do it. If you have a dream, try hard to make it come true. Who knows? You might even succeed!"
