Subject: Maths

## **Counting with coins**

Objective: counting with coins

Vocabulary: numbers 1–20, ball, plane, kite, train

#### Introduction

Pupils will be familiar, through work in the maths class, with the different denominations of coins. Many of the maths problems at this stage are done using currency.

## Warm up

- Pupils count up to 20, one after the other. On every multiple of five, the pupil says *fizz* rather than the number.
- Repeat with pupils saying *fizz* for multiples of three; then with four.

#### **Activity 1**

- Write on the board 1€ = 100c.
- Pupils count the coins and write the total.
- Point to frame 1 and ask *How much money is there?*
- Continue with the rest of the frames.

**Answers:** 1€ 5c; 11€; 5€ 3c; 2€ 14c

#### **Activity 2**

- Point to the toys and ask *How much is the (ball)?*
- Read Eddie's speech bubble and ask *What can Eddie buy?* Repeat with Rose.
- Pupils write the answers.
- Ask pupils to read the completed sentences out loud.

Answers: 1-ball, plane; 2-train, plane, ball

### **Activity 3**

- Read the speech bubbles out loud. Ask How much money has Rose got now?
- Pupils work out the answers. Repeat the question, then pupils answer.
- Ask volunteers to come to the board and show how they did the sums (subtracting the amount spent from the original amount).

Answers: Eddie: 2€; Rose: 1€

#### Project ideas

- Bring a selection of small change to the class. Pupils sort it out into 1€ piles.
- Pupils make a note of how they spend money over the week: they either note what they spend their pocket money on, or what extra treats their parents buy for them. Pupils work out how much money they spend.
