Susan: What is the biggest problem for seniors in nursing homes?

Sam: We wanted to help, so we started a website called *Teens and Seniors*. The website is for teenagers with free time who want to help. It plans their visits to nursing homes for lonely senior citizens.

Susan: Were a lot of teens interested?

Valerie: Yes! It was great! We started the website last year, and now we have about 40 volunteers. You can check that on our website.


