## Play and Learn Crazy Eyes

## How to play?

| Level: Elementary <br> Age: Children (Pre-primary) <br> Aime needed: 10 minutes <br> communication skills <br> Skills: Vocabulary, Speaking <br> Materials needed: Cut out face parts, <br> thumbtacks, magnets or <br> any safe object to place <br> face parts |
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## Warm-up Tips

Before completing this activity, play a body parts song. You can use one from your course material or choose one from the internet. It would be more helpful to use a song about face parts. Use the song to review body/face parts. Then take time to point at each face part and ask Where are my eyes? Encourage students to use simple vocabulary like up, down, on the right, on the left. This will help them to remember useful words to play.

## Instructions: Crazy Eyes

- Cut and prepare several sets of face parts in advance and divide the class into small groups. Get a bandana to cover students' eyes.
- Give a set of face parts to each team.
- Draw one face per team on the board. Do not draw any face parts.
- Explain to students that they will take turns to cover their eyes and try to paste the parts on the face.
- The rest of the team can give directions to help their classmate. Encourage students to use simple directions like up, down, to the left, to the right.
- Each student will repeat the process until the face is complete.
- Enjoy and have fun with the results!


## Follow up Activities

This activity is a great opportunity to introduce body awarness and identity. It would have a positive impact on awarness and identity. It would have a positive impact on
students to remind them that all body/face features are different and beautiful.

Find and cut different face parts in advance from magazines and newspapers. Sit in a circle and place the face parts in the center. Hold a mirror and ask students to pass one by one, look at the mirror and pick up the face part that is similar to their own.
