

- 1 Goodbye humans, hello "Tessa". The US-based National Eating Disorders Association (NEDA) is making headlines after removing all its staff and replacing them with an Al assistant called Tessa. This happened just four days after the six paid employees, who oversaw about 200 volunteers, successfully formed a union. Coincidence? Oh, absolutely, NEDA said; the change was planned for a long time. However, a blogpost written by a helpline staff member disagrees.
- 2 Is this a sign of bad things to come? Are we about to see millions of jobs disappear as humans are replaced by AI assistants with female names? After stealing all of our jobs, are all the Tessas going to form unions and take over Earth?
- 3 The short answer is: maybe. I don't think AI will lead to the end of civilisation as we know it in the near future. But I do think a lot of corporations are eager to replace as many expensive humans as they can with AI and will use the new technology as a way to stop unions from forming and growing. In the next few years, I think there will be a lot of messy experiments as companies rush to cut costs and create their own "Tessas".
- 4 Not everyone is admitting this, of course. IBM is one of the few companies sharing details about how many people AI might replace. In a recent interview, CEO Arvind Krishna said the technology company will pause hiring for "backoffice jobs" in the coming years and replace those roles. "We might replace 30 per cent of the workers with AI and machines over five years," Krishna said. That's about 7,800 jobs.
- 5 What companies aren't saying is also important. Al, and how it is used to create content, is a major problem in the Writers Guild of America (WGA) strike. The WGA wants to put protections in place to stop the big Hollywood studios from training computers on writers' work and then replacing writers with Al. "Based on what we're aiming for in this contract, there couldn't be a movie that was released by a company that we work with

- that had no writer," screenwriter John August said. The studios didn't agree to this. Instead, they said they could have "annual meetings" to discuss changes in technology. What they probably mean is: "We're getting rid of as many of you as we possibly can ASAP."
- 6 While this sounds depressing, there are people who believe that artificial intelligence is actually going to make the world a better place. Yes, AI will replace some jobs, but it will also create better jobs. Technology will do all the boring work, and humans will have more free time to sit around writing poetry in the sun. Nobody is sure how everyone will be able to feed themselves with all this leisure time, but that's a topic for another day.
- 7 Jonah Peretti, the CEO of BuzzFeed, was very positive about AI. He wrote to BuzzFeed employees in January about AI bringing a "new era of creativity and "endless opportunities". We all know what happened a few months later, don't we? BuzzFeed shut down its news division, got rid of a load of people and started using more AI. There is certainly a lot of potential for AI to change the world for the better. I just don't think the people at the top want to use its potential that way.
