- 1 People forced to leave their home countries and start a new life elsewhere face many challenges and problems. Living in an unknown place, sometimes learning a new language, getting used to new customs, and finding new jobs may be extremely difficult under these circumstances. Things can be even more challenging for women with childcare responsibilities. They have a harder time attending language lessons or receiving training in new skills. Bread and Roses helps refugee women overcome these barriers.
- 2 Bread and Roses is a social enterprise for women refugees. It aims to help them learn new skills, get work experience, and practise their English. They do this through floristry training programmes, which allow participants to build a new network, make friends, learn a new skill, and enjoy the therapeutic benefits of working with flowers in a welcoming, safe environment. Bread and Roses wants to give refugee women the practical and emotional skills that will help them succeed in the workplace.
- 3 37-year-old Monica arrived in the United Kingdom from Ghana as a student. 'I've never had the chance to build a career, and then, as an asylum seeker, I wasn't allowed to work,' she explains. For women like Monica, Bread and Roses didn't only help with practical skills. She says, 'I loved working with the plants, but I also learned English and social skills like networking, working as a team, and not being afraid to ask for help.'

- 4 Olivia Head and Sneh Jani set up Bread and Roses. These two young women met on a training programme for social entrepreneurs. Sneh was interested in working with women and had spent time helping refugees with translation in Germany. Olivia was working in a hostel for homeless people, including asylum seekers, and wanted to help people become ready to work. Nowadays, trainees come from countries across Africa and the Middle East, and a professional florist leads each workshop. Olivia says it is wonderful to see the women work and create something they are proud of.
- 5 Nour arrived from Syria when she was 25. She wants to work as a teacher when her English improves. At Bread and Roses, some women speak English and Arabic, so they could translate for her and teach her words. For Olivia and Sneh, learning in a workplace rather than a classroom is an advantage. Participants have to come along each week, be on time, apply their English, and learn new things. Olivia explains, 'It's all about building their workplace confidence and connecting them with other women from around the world.'
