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From Titanic to American Sniper: the biggest lies in fact-based movies

Level 2: Intermediate – Teacher's notes

Article summary: The author describes inaccuracies in The Blind Side, Captain Phillips, Titanic, Patch Adams, and American Sniper.

Time: 90 minutes

Skills: Reading, Speaking

Language focus: Vocabulary: collocations

Materials needed: One copy of the worksheet per student

1. Warmer

a. This activity aims to introduce the topic of movies, especially those based on true events. Ask students to discuss the questions. Then, ask them to scan the article, find the names of the films, and predict what inaccuracies will be mentioned in the article.

2. Key words

a. Ask students to do the exercise individually and then compare their answers in pairs or small groups.

3. Comprehension check

a. Students have to read the text carefully to identify the facts (and therefore also the historically inaccurate statements).

Key:

Facts: 4, 6, 7

Inaccuracies:

- 1. He was never formally adopted.
- 2. He petitioned a court to end his relationship with them legally.
- 3. False (see 4)
- 5. Kilts were not yet invented, and he was a member of the aristocracy.
- 8. They would have barely met, if they ever did.
- 9. He received medals, just not the number he claimed.

4. Key language

Students could be asked to do this exercise in small a. groups. Encourage them to support their answers by looking in the text.

- a. Ask students to reflect on the films they mentioned in the warmer. Have them choose a film and research its accuracy and the historical events the film is based on.
- b. Give students time to make notes and prepare to share with the class. They can then share their findings in small groups.
