- 1 Students at more than 50 high schools in the US are suggesting a Green New Deal for Schools. They demand that their districts teach climate justice, create pathways to green jobs after they graduate and plan for climate disasters.
- 2 The campaign is led by a group of youth called the Sunrise Movement. They are reacting to efforts to ban climate education and activism in schools.
- 3 "We are prepared to do whatever it takes," said Adah Crandall, 17, an organiser for the Sunrise Movement based in Portland, Oregon.
- 4 "The far right has fought this battle against public education, and they put a lot of time and money into trying to do things like ban books and prevent us from learning the truth about the climate crisis," said Crandall.
- 5 The Green New Deal for Schools includes demands to update school buildings, buses and other infrastructure. They are also asking that administrators develop climate disaster plans to keep students safe during extreme weather.
- 6 Students across the US know that many of the weather extremes they have experienced have been made worse by fossil fuels.
- 7 But at school, most teachers have avoided or discouraged the discussion of any topics that could be considered political, including climate justice.
- 8 Under Georgia's "divisive concepts" law, teachers cannot talk about climate justice and the unequal toll of global heating.
- 9 Earlier this year, the Texas state board of said schools should emphasise the "positive" aspects of fossil fuels in science textbooks. Florida's education board approved the sharing of videos that compare climate activists to Nazis. In Idaho, students and teachers are still fighting a long battle to include the climate crisis in Idaho's school content.

- 10 "It's really scary knowing that I'm underage and can't vote to elect the people making these big decisions about our futures," said Aster Chau, a 15-year-old student at Philadelphia's Academy at Palumbo.
- 11 To prepare for the fight ahead, about 150 high schoolers from across the US attended a summer camp in Illinois where they learned more about activism.
- 12 At the end of September, hundreds of students will go to Washington, DC, as the lawmakers reintroduce their Green New Deal for Public Schools Act. The laws will help schools expand and create new content, hire staff and update campuses.
