'Could be the next big thing': how pickleball is courting a new generation of players

- 1 Someone came up with pickleball in the US in 1965. It is a mix between ping pong, tennis and badminton.
- 2 Many people play pickleball in Australia. Some people say it is now the fastest-growing sport in the country.
- 3 There are about 20,000 pickleball players in Australia. The average player's age is about 58 years old. Ron Shell, the chief executive of Australia's National Pickleball League, believes in three years there will be at least 1 million players.
- 4 But there is a challenge: finding pickleball courts. They are about a third the size of a tennis court, with a lower net.
- 5 Fleming, who is 52 and is based in Sydney, started playing pickleball in 2019 after her tennis partner said: "I've found a new sport for us." She says the usual solution is to tape down lines and string nets across tennis, netball or basketball courts. This sharing means players can't always play.
- 6 That is starting to change. In September 2023, the first pickleball-only courts were opened in Sydney. They used to be a multi-purpose tennis, basketball and netball court.
- 7 It's starting to catch on in the US. Players are expected to reach 22 million this year, and people are fighting about courts.
- 8 US tennis players don't want to give up their courts, and people who live by courts complain about the noise. Will picklers have the same problems in Australia?
- 9 Shell thinks the noise is unlikely to be a problem because Australia's sport centres aren't usually in residential areas. Also, new types of less noisy rackets are starting to come out.
- 10 Shell says they are talking with Tennis Australia to "work together". A spokesperson for Tennis Australia says it supports the idea of people playing pickleball at tennis facilities but only where those courts are being under-used.

- 11 Investors also realised that they could make money from pickleball. In November, an indoor pickleball centre will open in South Melbourne. Sydney may have a centre next year and, soon after, Brisbane and Perth.
- 12 Shell hopes this will make pickleball popular among the young and people will realise it can be a sport for all ages.
- 13 Up to now, it has been popular among older players because it is easier on the body compared to tennis.
- "It's very social, so you can just hang out with family members, with friends. It's really starting to grab the attention of a lot of younger people now, and it's only going to grow," says Sydneysider Mitch Hargreaves, 25, the World Pickleball Singles male Champion.
