



Schools in England using Airbnb-style strategy to raise funds

Level 1: Elementary – Teacher's notes

Article summary: The article talks about some UK schools' new strategy to raise money, renting out the school

Time: 60 minutes

Skills: Reading, Speaking, Writing

Language focus: Words used as nouns

and verbs

Materials needed: One copy of the

worksheet per student

1. Warmer

a. This activity aims to get students thinking and discussing ways to raise money, particularly around schools. You may wish to elicit examples of fundraising activities and donations. Students may make parallels to charities or other non-profit organisations. Encourage students to share personal experiences and opinions.

2. Key words

a. Ask students to do the exercise individually and compare their answers in pairs or small groups.

3. Comprehension check

a. Students answer the questions based on the information in the article. They may do this in different ways, e.g., in item 1, they may say, 'To raise money, schools are renting out different spaces in their schools' or similar.
