I'm only seeing bands I loved when I was 14. Am I in a musical rut – or is this growing up?

Level 3: Advanced – Teacher's notes

Article summary: The article describes how the author's musical tastes have remained the same over 20 years and discusses whether our interest in new music stops when we reach the age of 30.

Time: 45–60 minutes

Skills: Reading, Speaking

Language focus: Vocabulary

Materials needed: One copy of the worksheet per student

1. Warmer

a. This activity aims to get students thinking about some well-known bands and solo musicians of different eras. You could expand the activity to ask students to suggest other names for each period, for example, Taylor Swift (the 2000s). Note that while we say *nineteen-nineties* for 1990s and *twenty-tens* for 2010s, etc., we say *noughties* for the 2000s.

2. Key words

a. Ask students to do the exercise individually and compare their answers in pairs or small groups. Note that a *gig* is not normally used for performances other than those of rock or pop music. If people have feelings of *nostalgia*, they usually think about a past period with the impression that their life was better then. A *rut* is literally the groove made by a vehicle on a muddy track. If you are *in a rut*, the idea, idiomatically, is that you can't get out.
