- 1 The young male was seen at about 4 am. He stopped briefly in front of the camera.
- 2 Emily Burns, the programme director at Sky Island Alliance (SIA) in Arizona, said that she was excited and surprised to see the jaguar.
- 3 Jaguars once lived in the American southwest but were killed in the 1960s. In the 1990s, cats were sometimes seen in New Mexico and Arizona. Over the past year, they have been seen many times.
- 4 But there are problems with helping the jaguars return to the US. The cat faces climate change, habitat loss – and the Trump administration's border wall.
- In November 2023, SIA took a photo of a large jaguar walking along the Whetstone Mountains. It was the fifth recorded sighting in the US that year. In December, they captured a video of the same jaguar in the Huachuca Mountains.
- 6 The Whetstone and Huachuca Mountains are part of the Sky Islands in northern Mexico and the US southwest. There are many types of plants and animals, which make it a good habitat for jaguars.
- 7 Jaguars eat the pig-like javelina, which lives there, and there is water all year.
- 8 "If these mountains can support jaguar, it means it is a great habitat for so many other species as well," says Burns.
- 9 Louise Misztal, Executive Director at SIA, says that the Huachuca Mountains and the San Rafael Valley allow jaguars to move between the US and Mexico.
- 10 But that is in danger because of the border wall, which began under Donald Trump's presidency and continued under Biden's.
- 11 There are many endangered species, such as ocelots, wolves, pronghorns, and jaguars. These animals, and many others, have been negatively affected by the nearly 364 km-long wall.

- 12 This means that Jaguars must use more energy and travel longer distances to reach their habitat or to find food and water.
- 13 Krista Schlyer is a photographer and author who has worked for 15 years in the area. She has seen the problems created by the border wall, including dead or lost animals. In 2007, Schlyer noticed javelinas near the San Pedro River.
- 14 "They were smelling for their family on the other side," Schlyer says. They finally gave up and left. That wall section is now 70 miles long.
- 15 McSpadden says that it is very important to protect jaguars' habitat. Traphagen says the wall's construction could mean the end of jaguars in the US.
