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Will other cities copy Paris decision to hike parking charges for SUVs?

Level 3: Advanced – Teacher's notes

Article summary: The article describes how Paris plans to introduce higher charges for parking SUVs (sports utility vehicles) in the city and reports that the people of Paris have voted in favour of this increase in a referendum.

Time: 45–60 minutes

Skills: Reading, Speaking

Language focus: Vocabulary

Materials needed: One copy of the worksheet per student

1. Warmer

a. This activity aims to activate students' general knowledge (in this case, about world capital cities). The activity could be extended by asking students which other capital cities they know (in neighbouring countries or elsewhere). It could also be a team game with points awarded for the most correct answers.

2. Key words

a. Ask students to do the exercise individually and compare their answers in pairs or small groups. Note that the verb hail in item 3 is a journalistic use of the word, meaning praise or greet warmly. Another word for *polarising* is *divisive*, which refers to something that divides people because of confronting opinions. Note that *hike* (used in the headline) is a journalistic word used to mean increase in this use and win over (also used in the headline) means persuade people to support something.

3. Comprehension check

The answers given are only suggested, and students a. may correctly answer the questions differently. For example, in item 2, they may say, 'They are increasing a lot' or 'They are soaring.'
