- 1 This International Women's Day, Meg's* life will feel no less busy than it does on any other day. Like her husband, the 43-year-old from Sydney works five days a week she also has a second job in the evenings. They have three young children, a mortgage and no family in Australia.
- 2 She is not alone. The latest Household, Income and Labour Dynamics in Australia (Hilda) survey shows that in 2022, men spent around 12.8 hours a week on housework. 20 years earlier, they did exactly the same amount. The situation for women is worse. Women do 50 per cent more than men (around 18.4 hours). Dr Inga Lass, the report's co-author, found that women thought the division of unpaid labour was unfair.

Gender norms

3 "This is not a surprise to me," political economist Prof Elizabeth Hill says of the Hilda findings. She explains that even when a woman has a job and her male partner does not, she still does most of the housework. How much we can earn does not change how work is divided at home. Gender norms have a bigger effect, Lass suggests. "I think it starts with how boys and girls are being raised, and what they're being taught."

Work and home lives

4 Before having a baby, women do around the same share of housework and paid work as their male partners, then roles dramatically change. "Having babies just shifts the dynamic within couples so much ... You're at home all the time ... so you start doing all the domestic chores," Meg says.

More flexible work

- 5 Hill says that in Nordic countries where more money is spent on parental leave for both men and women, fathers who care for their babies continue to be involved in childcare years later.
- 6 As well as more generous paid parental leave and childcare systems, Australia needs more flexible work. "We're heading in the right direction, but we need to go much faster, and we need to include all aspects of society," says Hill.
