- I was cooking one afternoon when I heard something in my yard. I walked outside and, through the leaves, two black eyes appeared. It was a small brushtail possum. Its pink nose was swollen, and some of its fur was missing. I ran inside and picked up some fruit and put it on the fence. Over the afternoon, I watched the sick possum slowly eat. Then, at the end of the day, it put its head onto its chest and fell asleep.
- 2 Feeding native wildlife is a difficult issue. I called a wildlife rescue organisation and they told me to catch the possum and take it to a vet. My husband tried this, but the possum quickly ran away.
- 3 A few days later, it returned. But I was not keen on trying to catch the possum again. I worried that the stress might kill it. So, I started leaving food for it. Giving it pieces of apple and carrot seemed like a good thing to do.
- 4 Brushtail possums in their natural environment eat plants and leaves. This is why Clare McArthur from the University of Sydney says we shouldn't feed possums: "How good is [the food] we're feeding them? "If they rely on us, what happens when we go away?"

- John Grant from the wildlife rescue organisation says feeding isn't helpful. "They can lose their fear of humans and cats and dogs," he says. "It's best to feed possums with natural food," McArthur says that giving a possum healthy food might not be so bad. "Now and then, it would be OK, because one of the good things is that we start to value the wildlife around us."
- 6 Professor Darryl Jones from Griffith University agrees that feeding wildlife can help people love them. "Only when people care about and try and understand the wildlife around us will they protect them."
- 7 Sometimes I still see the possum on our fence. It eats from my vegetable garden every few days. Some nights, it looks like there's been a possum party in our yard with fruit everywhere! My husband still leaves out an apple for the possum, even though we know we shouldn't. I still think it's ok to do that.
