TEACHER'S NOTES

Topics: Environment by Adrian Tennant



LEVEL: Pre-intermediate AGE: Teenagers / Adults TIME NEEDED: 90 minutes + project LANGUAGE FOCUS: Mixed tenses, understanding vocabulary in context, topic words

LEAD-IN

Put students in pairs and ask them to match the words in the box to the correct pictures. Check the answers together.

Key a .

1. congestion; 2. recycling; 3. litter; 4. solar energy; 5. allotment (a plot of land where people grow vegetables, etc.); 6. landfill

Next, put the students into small groups to talk about what they know about the issues in the pictures. Monitor and help where necessary, then have whole-class feedback.

READING 1: HEADLINES

Ask students to work in small groups and discuss what each heading might be about. Monitor and help where necessary. Finally, open it out into a class discussion and write up some of the ideas on the board.

READING 2: COUNCIL LEAFLET

Ask students to read through the texts and match the headlines to the correct story. After a few minutes, put students in pairs and get them to check their answers together before checking as a class.

Key a -

1. Feed the world! Well, start with your family; 2. Cycle, don't drive; 3. Cleaner streets for the town; 4. One green, one brown and one black; 5. Make money from the sun!

Next, ask the students to try to answer the five comprehension questions. Again, get students to check their answers in pairs before checking as a class.

Key b -

£100; 2. grow vegetables or other things, keep chickens;
installing solar panels; 4. on the council website; 5. green (you could also elicit 'bottle bank')

WORKING WITH THE LANGUAGE

Ask students to look at the five extracts from the leaflet and try to think which tense is being used. Next, ask students to look at the five tenses listed in the box and to try and match each one to the correct sentence. Tell them to work in pairs to check their answers together before checking as a class.

Key_

present simple; 2. present perfect; 3. future continuous;
simple future passive; 5. future simple

Note: If students haven't learnt all five tenses before, then tell them not to worry. Looking at the sentences in context will help them to work out why each tense has been used, i.e. what time does the sentence refer to? Is the action more important than the person who does the action?

WORKING WITH VOCABULARY

Focus 1: Meaning

Ask students to look back at the leaflet and find words that match the definitions. Encourage them to work in pairs and discuss their ideas together. If students get stuck, suggest they look at the next activity to see if this helps them. Check the answers as a class.

have green fingers; 2. leases; 3. marked; 4. route; 5. attempt
patrolling; 7. households; 8. announced; 9. installing;

Focus 2: Topic-related words

Ask students to read the five sentences and circle the correct word in each to complete it. Encourage the students to look back at the stories in the leaflet to help them. Get the students to check their ideas with their partner before checking the answers as a class.

Key_

1. cycle; 2. waste; 3. solar; 4. littering; 5. green

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LISTENING

Ask students to listen to a short excerpt from a local radio show. Ask them which of the stories from the leaflet it is similar to and also what the differences are between the story and the radio show. Play the recording again, if necessary, and check the answers as a class.

Key

It is similar to story 3 but the main topic is different – the radio show is about parking, whereas the story on the leaflet is about littering. Also, the radio show is about something which has already been introduced, whereas the leaflet is talking about something which is happening next week. The other differences are: traffic wardens / community wardens; £50 / £100 fine; extra information in the radio show about the mayor being fined.

Transcript:

... and in local news, last week, Townsville District Council introduced increased fines for illegal parking. Traffic wardens can now fine motorists who park in the wrong place a maximum of $\pounds 50$. The funny thing is that the first person to pay the fine was the mayor of the town!

SPEAKING

Put students in small groups and ask them to discuss the questions together.

Afterwards, ask a few groups to report back on their discussion. You could open this out to the whole class.

PROJECT

Ask students to carry out the project for homework, either individually or in pairs / groups, and follow it up in the next lesson.


