AIM

To act out a staff reunion party set in the future.

PREPARATION

Make one copy of the worksheet for each student.

TIME

10-20 minutes

PROCEDURE

- 1 Tell the students they are going to act out a party situation.
- 2 Write the following dialogue on the board:
A: *John. How _____ to see you!*
J: *Annie! I haven't seen you since _____. ! How _____ you?*
A: *Very well. I'm _____ now.*
J: *You don't say! That's _____. Who to?*
A: *Peter Willis. Do you _____ him?*
J: *Yes, of course I do. Are you still _____ in the same place?*
A: *No. I _____ last year.*
- 3 Elicit words to go in the gaps. For example: *nice, 1989, are, married, incredible, remember, living, moved.*
- 4 Get one pair to act out the conversation.
- 5 As appropriate, drill key sentences for intonation. For example: *That's inCREDible.*
- 6 Tell them to imagine that ten years have passed: ask what year it is now. Write the date on the board.
- 7 Tell them they have all been very successful in life.
- 8 Give out the worksheets.
- 9 Ask the students to fill in the worksheets for 'now', ie the date in ten years' time. They should briefly note one 'fact' in each section of the worksheet. Allow 7-8 minutes.
- 10 The students act out the situation. They meet at a party, not having seen each other for ten years since this English class, and exchange news and memories.

FOLLOW-UP

Each student writes a profile (50-100 words) of someone they met at the party, then reads it out to the class.
